## How Easily We Forget

Have you ever had the experience of pulling out the Christmas decorations at the start of the season and wondering, "Now, where did we put that \_\_\_\_\_." You could be looking for a special ornament, a box of lights, a set of placemats — whatever the item might be — and no matter how many times you go through all the boxes of decorations, you can't seem to find it. If you could just rewind the clock to that January or February afternoon when you boxed up everything, then you would remember where you put it. You can't believe that it's been less than a year and you've already forgotten such a simple thing.

Our memory can surprise us with its strength, such as when after a decade we return to our family's cherished vacation spot and find ourselves miraculously remembering directions from one place to another as if it were just yesterday that we were there. Our memory can also surprise us with its fragility, such as in the Christmas decoration example above. How powerfully we can remember, but how easily we can forget.

As we move past February into March, we find ourselves deep in the season of Lent, a time in the church year in which take a step back from our normal routines, celebrations, and pleasures to think more seriously about our sin and our need for a Savior. Perhaps you decide to fast at this time of year, giving up something so that you might take some of the excesses of your life out of the picture in order to focus on what's missing in your relationship with God. Perhaps you attend the midweek Lent services each Wednesday evening. Whatever your practice is, the idea is that around this time of year, there are certain things you do — that we all do — as a part of our faith.

Now, maybe these rituals are just as meaningful to you each new year as they were the last. But perhaps as we enter yet another season of Lent, you are finding yourself wondering, "Why am I doing this? Why am I giving this thing up? Why am I going to services each week? Why does worship seem more serious or somber? If Jesus has forgiven me of my sins, why do I have to focus so much on them? It's easy for it all to start seeming rehearsed or routine, obligatory or without heart and meaning.

Believe it or not, there is a reason we do these things every year; there is a reason God gave us certain seasons and certain holy days to observe. It's not because He feels forgotten and wants our attention. No, it's because He knows *our* habit of forgetting and heading down the wrong path. Just before the Israelites were about to enter the promised land, God sent them a warning. He knew they were about to experience prosperity, and He knew in this prosperity, the Israelites would be in danger of forgetting their God and all He commanded them to do: "Take care, lest you forget your God by not keeping His commandments and rules and His statutes, which I command you today, lest when you have eaten your full and built good houses to live in...then your heart be lifted up, and you forget the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt out of the house of slavery." (Deuteronomy 8:11-14). God was saying that ease and comfort had the potential of being snares for the Israelites. None of us is above falling off track with God. None of us has fully graduated from the disposition to sin once we're saved. As the old hymn "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" says it: "Prone to wander, Lord I feel it. Prone to leave the God I love..."

We all need a reminder. We all need to be drawn back to God. That is what Lent is for. That is what this season of penitence is all about. Yes, as believers Jesus has saved us from sin, but that doesn't mean we still don't sin every day. As we pray prayers asking for forgiveness, as we sing hymns of sorrow that remind us of Jesus' sacrifice for us and His love for us, we are to be stirred to remember. Like the dinner bell on the farm that calls the family in for supper, the focus on repentance during Lent is meant to draw us back home, to bring us into the presence of our Savior, to ask for forgiveness and to receive His love.

As familiar as this season might feel, this Lent may you welcome the voice of God into your life in a new way. May you allow Him to speak to your heart and draw you near.

## **Lenten Sermon Series**

(Sundays 8 A.M. and 10:30 A.M. worship)

On the mountaintop, Jesus appeared to His disciples with a different appearance — His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became as white as light (Matthew 17:2-3). In place of the mangled state He would endure on the cross, Jesus' transfigured body was a preview of the transformation that He would experience when He rose from the dead victorious over sin.

Jesus went through a transfiguration, or transformation, but He is not the only one. As we become believers, we too undergo a transfiguration through the power of the Holy Spirit. 2 Corinthians 3:18 says "And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another." In place of our broken lives of sin, we become new creations (2 Corinthians 5:17) who over time come to look more and more like Jesus.

How does this transformation happen? Through our relationship with Christ, through the time we spend with Him, and through an encounter with His word.

This Lenten season, we are going to welcome the transforming work of God in our lives as we study what the Scriptures have to say about the common words we use as Christians, words like faith, glory, love, and salvation. We say these words a lot, but do we really know what they mean? Together we will look to the instruction of God through the Bible so that we might know what these words mean and that we might truly know our Lord better. Join us each week as we unpack another commonly used word in our Christian vocabulary and learn what it really means.

## ELDERS DEVOTION

I am an avid reader and love to read a variety of books. Recently, I read “The Fingerprint of God”, authored by Will Dickerson, an ordained pastor. Will got his MDiv from Princeton, a PhD in medieval history from Cornell and MEd from Karoli Gaspar University in Budapest, Hungary. I know Will as he was the husband of my deceased cousin Diane. Recently Will reached out to me via Facebook Messenger, sending me family pictures my cousin had collected over many years as well as his book. Briefly, Will took a job teaching high school English in 1993 in Budapest, Hungary, four (4) years after the fall of Communism (an atheist society) and lived there for over 25 years. Brenda and I got to visit with my cousin Diane and Will in Budapest prior to starting our Danube River cruise in 2013. He has now returned to Budapest (remarried) teaching as well as becoming an author.

While reading this book, I was intrigued by Will’s teaching method by trying to describe words, such as ‘friendship’, ‘humor’... going from concrete to abstract things. The word that severely challenged his students was to describe ‘love’ and what it was. He questioned them on ‘how to love’ in our dog-eat-dog world. God has instructed us to love one another. A search of the word ‘love’ using my phone app ‘Bible Gateway’ showed 630 search results for ‘love’.

1 Corinthians 13:1-13 gives us one of the most famous definitions of love.

*“If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. <sup>2</sup> If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. <sup>3</sup> If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.*

*<sup>4</sup> Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. <sup>5</sup> It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. <sup>6</sup> Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. <sup>7</sup> It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.*

*<sup>8</sup> Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. <sup>9</sup> For we know in part and we prophesy in part, <sup>10</sup> but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. <sup>11</sup> When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. <sup>12</sup> For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.*

*<sup>13</sup> And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.*

I truly believe we all need to embody this scripture passage in our daily lives. We all remember last November and all the election emails, commercials, mailings that seemed to consume our every waking moment to ‘pick the right person’ because the other candidate is wrong. I try my best to not enter into a political discussion because it becomes a very personal matter and tends to divide people and emphasize what Will Dickerson stated about a ‘dog eat dog’ world. What we need to do is speak and demonstrate love. Will tried to make the case that “if God is love, then the Christian faith is not a set of rules, nor a set of procedures, nor even a set of doctrine. If God is love, then the Christian faith is a relationship – a personal relationship with our Creator and Savior, a relationship founded in love”. Will goes on to say “...to be a Christian – a follower of Christ – is first and foremost an act of love. It is to accept the love of the One who made us and to return that love with all of one’s heart, mind, soul and strength”. I believe we all need a personal relationship, a closer walk with God, trying each day to build upon it to make it stronger.

Let’s take this ‘lesson’ about love to show others what we can do when Christ is in our lives and directs our paths. Sure, we will have ‘bad’ days when showing love is the last thing we are thinking about. Jesus had a bad day when He was crucified and through it showed us how much He REALLY loved us...by taking away our sins as long as we commit to Him as our Lord and Savior! I bet your ‘bad day’ could not come close to Jesus’ last day on Earth...so...let’s just take time each day to show love! It is really very easy!

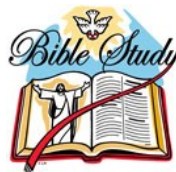

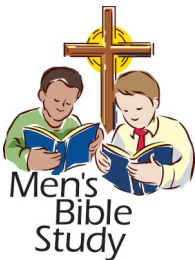

# Organ Progress!

They are working on our organ! Brunner & Associates posted a picture of one of the keyboards of our organ on their Facebook page as they were repairing it. You can find it here, even if you are not a Facebook member: <https://www.facebook.com/Brunner-Associates-LLC-Organ-Builders-876360502381738/>

While the pieces of our organ are at the Brunner & Associates warehouse, other things are going on at church to prepare for the organ's return. Damaged ceiling tiles in the balcony have been replaced, and the ceiling inside the pipe chamber has been repaired and stabilized. The emergency lights that were fastened to the top of the pipe chamber have been moved over onto the ceiling. The roofing company has installed a waterproof barrier in the attic above the pipe chamber to catch any future leaks, with a sump pump to force the water out of the steeple. In addition, there will be an alarm in the attic to alert when any water is present, so that we can be sure it has been removed. This is all to try to make sure that a water leak never ruins the organ again. Thanks to Jack Breidinger and Dennis Silvius for all their work on this project.

The wood exterior of the pipe chamber is also being refurbished and refinished. Once we removed the benches in front of the pipe chamber, we could see that there was water damage to the wooden exterior. There are also normal dings where furniture bumped into the finished wood. Dennis Silvius is repairing all of those wear and tear items so that the exterior will look as great as the new organ will sound.

We are nearing the goal of the Organ Restoration Fund, but please don't stop giving! We need to push through to the finish line. Every contribution, no matter how small, is important.

Dear Congregation Members:

**Our congregation is in financial trouble.** Less than two months into 2023, we are already behind around \$15,000. We had to borrow \$5300 from various internal funds to pay our 2022 Common Ministries Commitment in full, and \$2000 needs to be paid back to the Organ Fund upon the completion of the organ repairs, most likely April or May.

This deficit is not due to excessive or additional spending. So far in 2023 we have had to pay \$4620 in heating bills for the church and parsonage and \$1768 for electric. A total of \$7159 has been paid for quarterly insurance premium, quarterly parsonage real estate tax payment, payment for four Synod participants, and snow plowing costs. Plus, we owe \$11,440 for Common Ministries and Eastern District commitments. There are invoices coming in for the waterproofing in the steeple attic and heating repairs.

We are sending out a plea to all members, regular givers and especially those members that have not made a donation to the church so far this year, to possibly pay a little **extra** to get us out of this deficit. Schoeneck has always been very generous with mission projects, however, now we are asking all of you to put the money where it is really needed: the General Fund, Wider Ministries, and Provincial Administration.

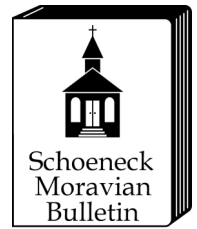

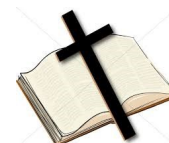
