Love, God's Way of Transforming Our Lives

On January 14, we celebrated Epiphany communion, postponed from January 7 due to a snowstorm that caused travel concerns. At our Epiphany celebration, Rev. Dr. Betsy Miller provided a wonderful message titled "Being Light, Being Witness." In her message, Rev. Betsy told us to 'be a light and a witness to others', using the life of recently deceased Rt. Rev. Hopeton Clennon as a prime example of someone given that gift from God. Acts 13:47 describes how we should use our light to shine and be a witness, "For this is what the Lord has commanded us: I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth."

Starting on February 14, we celebrate Ash Wednesday that begins the season of Lent. February 14 is also Valentine's Day, the day when we are supposed to declare our love and admiration for our loved ones. How ironic it is that we will celebrate the love for someone at the same time we begin our journey with Jesus; traveling 40 days that ends with his triumphant ride into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, his cruel crucifixion and death on Good Friday and his glorious resurrection on Easter Sunday. How can we 'be a light' to those we love at the same time while we begin a season of self-reflection to rededicate our lives to God?

The common theme between Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday, start of Lent is love, love for God and love for one another. Matthew 22:37-38 plainly states the love we need to have for God; "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment." The very next verse, 39, explains the love we should have for one another; "Love your neighbor as yourself." How well do you and I use these verses in our everyday lives? The world today has become so self-centered that we have forgotten how to show love to the person next to us in the grocery store checkout line, at the gas pump, or even speaking to a customer service representative when reporting a problem. We tend to express our love to those close to us but forget about those that really need to be shown love! It's easy on Valentine's Day because we are reminded (WELL before Christmas!) to show our love to your 'special someone'. What about showing love outside of this card-frenzy, gift-laden day?

How do we change our behavior to show love to everyone? Let us start our season of Lent using God's request in John 15:17, "This is my command: Love one another." What a perfect opportunity to begin a time of self-reflection, looking into our own lives through daily devotion and Bible study to change our attitude toward others. Will this be an easy request...absolutely not! Lent is a time when we, as an act of self-denial, can 'give up something', whether it be alcohol, sugary snacks, meat or anything else that may hinder you from listening to what God has in mind for your life. Use the season of Lent to open your heart and mind to seeing and experiencing the love that surrounds you. Take that love and share it with others, not just on Valentine's Day, but every day. According to Proverbs 18:16 "A gift opens the way for the giver and ushers us into the presence of the great." Give your gift of love to everyone you meet, being the light and witness, and I believe you will be blessed with what you receive!

MORAVIAN MISSION CORNER -

Essentials Café

A pay-what-you-can community café in West Bethlehem.

Led by seven local Moravian women, newly-opened Essentials Café is a place of equality where everyone can meet, feel welcome, and enjoy a delicious and healthy meal regardless of their ability to pay. There's a menu, but no prices.

Essentials Café is the first known pay-what-you-can café in the Lehigh Valley. It was inspired by Tricklebee Café, a Moravian ministry in Milwaukee, and is part of the nationwide organization "One World Everybody Eats."

Patrons at the café donate what they can – if they can – to eat breakfast and lunch meals together in a warm and hospitable environment. Volunteers work together to find, grow, cook, and serve food in a welcoming way. The idea is to alleviate food insecurity in the Lehigh Valley and to provide a place where friendships and understanding can flourish across all socio-economic groups.

Our own Schoeneck member and professional chef, Kim Samsel, leads the Essentials Café kitchen and menu planning. Kim works with seasonal ingredients, maximizes available food to reduce food waste and packs in as much nutrition as possible to the tasty menu offerings. Sample menu items include deep dish French toast bake with berry medley and savory western omelet bake, plus there are homemade soups, sandwiches and build-a-salad bowls. All food is made from scratch, including the sauces and dressings.

Essentials Café depends on the contributions of groups and volunteers from the community, including members of area Moravian churches, and relies on donations to operate.

In the spirit of collective commitment and thoughtful generosity, Moravians across America are gearing up for the fourth annual Moravian Day of Giving on February 13th, a day that transcends individual contributions to make a combined impact.

The Moravian Day of Giving is an opportunity for Moravians to make unexpected gifts above and beyond their regular tithe or pledge. On this day, individuals are encouraged to utilize the Moravian Ministries Foundation in America (MMFA)'s online Giving Portal to contribute to their church, Moravian agencies, or ministries that ignite passion and resonate with their values.

On previous Days of Giving, Schoeneck asked for contributions to the Organ Restoration fund or to the Schoeneck congregation. While we certainly will accept any gifts from this day, this year we encourage you to think about expanding your giving outside of our congregation. You can give to Esperanza, Camp Hope, Moravian Open Door, Essentials Café, or any other Moravian organization or ministry that you wish.

If you are undecided where to make a donation, MMFA suggests you consider a gift to a Field of Interest (FOI) Fund. These funds award grants to Moravian congregations and organizations for ministry projects in eight areas:

Hunger & Thirst Clothing

Housing & Shelter Healing & Health

Prison Ministry Environmental Stewardship

Racial Awareness Equity, & Reconciliation Prevention of Violence Against Women

In honor of MMFA's 25th anniversary, they challenge everyone to donate at least \$25 to one of the FOI funds to help unlock matching contributions of \$2,500 for each of the 8 FOI funds.

Additionally, MMFA will grant \$2,500 to the 5 Moravian organizations (churches, agencies, camps, etc.) with the most unique individual donors. "Unique individual donors" refers to the number of distinct individuals who donate on the Moravian Day of Giving. Each donor is counted only once, regardless of the number of times they contribute or the amount of their contributions. However, if a donor contributes to both their home congregation and a Moravian agency on the Moravian Giving Portal, that person will be counted as one donor for BOTH organizations. Donors are able to donate to more than one organization with one transaction.

From the Trustees: Envelopes:

You may have noticed a change in the monthly yellow envelope for Provincial Administration. The suggested amount was increased for 2024 to \$20 per individual and \$40 per couple each month. The money you give in this envelope is designated for Schoeneck's share of Common Ministries to the Northern Province. This helps pay for the Provincial and District staff, including those who are helping Schoeneck in the call process; for recruiting and training future pastors; for your subscription to The Moravian magazine, along with preparing other publications, the Daily Texts, and Moravian websites; for support to the Board of World Mission, Moravian Music Foundation, the Moravian Archives.

The recommended monthly contribution is only a part of what the congregation pays each year to these causes, but this envelope is a way for everyone to have a share.

The line on each weekly envelope for "Wider Ministry" helps pay for Schoeneck's share in Eastern District operations, as well as the pastor's medical insurance and pension. While we are without a pastor, we still pay into the Province's medical insurance program each month. That amount will not change when we get a pastor. We are not paying pension now, but we will once a new pastor begins.

We hope that each giving unit in the congregation will take advantage of these opportunities to share in these costs of operating our congregation.

A Gift for the Congregation

The musicians of Schoeneck, past and present, are presenting one additional rank of pipes for the organ as a gift to the congregation, in honor of our Director of Music, Ryan Morrow, and his going-on-thirteen years at Schoeneck. Although Ryan knew about the additional rank, he was not aware that it was in his honor until Christmas Eve, when the musicians informed him.

How did this happen? As the organ was being repaired and refurbished, there was room for one more rank of pipes to be added to the console. At the same time, Brunner & Associates had a set of 32 pipes in need of a good home. They offered to *give* us the pipes (wow!), if Schoeneck would pay for the cleaning, wiring and installation, a cost of around \$12,500. Schoeneck musicians have donated the entire amount, to the glory of God and in honor of Ryan.

The new pipes are a Leiblich Flute 16-foot pedal rank. They are played by the organ pedals, and will provide a softer low sound than what we have now, complementing the other pedal pipes. They are installed in the balcony in two rows outside of the existing pipe chamber, on the north (clock) side. As soon as they are fully installed, and Ryan has a chance to choose some music to show them off, the new stop will be dedicated and Ryan will demonstrate it to the congregation.

Merry belated Christmas, congregation, from your musicians!




